

Additionally...we shared recipes! So here they are hot off the press and out of the oven:

Sherry Abraham-Morrow's Microwave Luban: In a glass bowl put ½ gallon of homogenized milk and heat for 28-30 minutes on high. Remove it, and let it sit at room temperature for 45 minutes (120 degrees). Mix 3 tablespoons starter ("robee") with 3 tbsps of the warm milk, and gradually add to the large pot of warm milk. stirring until the starter is thoroughly mixed together with the warm milk. Place it back in the microwave to sit for 5 hours or overnight, no cover.

Elinor Bourjaily's Spinach Pies:

 $2 \frac{1}{2}$ lb. all-purpose flour (about $7 \frac{1}{2}$ cups) — or half wheat, half white flour $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp. salt

1/4 cup canola oil

I package regular yeast — mix with ½ cup warm water and a tsp of sugar Pour into a well of the flour. Add 2 ½ cups more of water (about 6 cups of water to 5 pounds). Knead together till smooth and elastic.

Place in an oiled pan, make the Sign of the Cross on the dough and let it rest in a warm place with a warm damp towel on top for one hour. Form 3 large balls; let rise another ½ hour. Roll out and use a big biscuit cutter, cut about 4" rounds. Let rest 10 minutes.

Put 1 heaping these, of filling in center of each round and fold up in a triangle, pinching the seams so they don't open.

Filling (place in a colander to drain) – 2-10 oz. pkgs. of fresh spinach, (wash, drain, towel dry, and chop up coarsely)

I bunch green onion, or 2 white ones chopped

1 hunch parsley, washed, dried and chopped

Fresh mint – the leaves of 6 sprigs, washed, dried, chopped

Salt, pepper, all spice, nutmeg, clove, citric acid or lemon juice and % cup oil

Cook in a 375-degree oven at least 20 minutes. Makes about 40-50 pies.

Janice's Montreal Cookies (Kawk or Easter Cookie)

8 cups flour

2 cups sugar

2 tsp. baking powder

3 eggs

1 lb. sweet butter

3 tablespoons mahlab (spice found in middle eastern shops-black cherry seeds crushed)

3/4 to I cup milk

Soften butter to room temp (microwave 40 sec.) and add sugar, eggs, mahlab, and beat.

Sift dry ingredients together and add to butter mixture. Add milk slowly, feel it to a rolling consistency, not too sticky. Make a ball of dough in a circle, and brush with egg and milk wash, then dip in sesame seeds. Bake at 325 until lightly brown.

Lenten Readings:

The One Thing Needful: Meditations for the Busy Orthodox Woman by Colette D. Jonopulos. This is a book with brief chapters for example, telling how important it is to stop and appreciate the world, to have a little icon corner, to approach obedience to God's will with joy. Every chapter is a treat.

Gabriel's Dragon by Archpriest Economos Antony Gabriel,

This is an account of one priest's struggle with cancer, a spiritual memoir a story of one whose life "continues to become transformed from the correct, external conduct of rites and ritual, form and function, to that internal, intense leap into the heart of the Divine whose tender embrace brings warmth to the very core of our heing." The Five People You Meet In Heaven by Mitch Albom is a delightful little novel that interprets heaven as a place where five people who were in your life and influened it, appear to weave meaning into the big picture. He also wrote Tuesdays with Morrie, which were discussed by some of our lady's groups.
